In Ennis Workhouse Lunatic Wards, 5 males. Under Medical treatment, 2 males, 4 females; under Surgical treatment, 1 male, 2 females.

MONTLY REPORT.

In his monthly report Dr. O'Mara said the health of the inmates was good, and the general state of the house satisfactory.

THE TEA CONTRACT.

The Clerk submitted the report of the Tea Tester on the samples of tea sent him. There had been 27 samples received, one of which was informal, and he had placed Nos. 3, 9, and 23 as first, second, and third, in order of merit. Out of 27 samples of tea tested, the first on the list was Mr. John Madigan, Ennistymon, the second was Mr. Denis McKenna, Tulla, and the third was Mr. M. Garry, Ennis. Selection adjourned till next meeting.

ASYLUM MAINTENANCE.

The Clerk submitted his estimate for the maintenance of the house for the coming year. The amount was £9,211 18s 4d. of which £5,200 would be leviable off the county, and the balance contributable by the Treasury.

POTATOE SUPPLY.

For the supply of best eating potatoes there were two tenders, and that of Michael Hayes, Gort, at 5d. was accepted, being threefarthings the lowest.

NOT GRANTED.

The O'Donnellan Blake Forster moved the resolution standing in his name, that Mr. Thomas Duggan, storekeeper, be granted the usual good service allowance, having completed eight years service in the Institution.

There was no seconder, and the motion fell through.

A letter was read from Lodgekeeper John Merryman, regretting that owing to continued ill-health he was obliged to apply for a superannuation allowance. He detailed his duties, sent in testimonials, and trusted that his 35 years' service entitled him to the fullest retiring allowance.

Mr. Lynch, J.P., gave notice of motion for the consideration of the application at their next meeting.

Attendant Michael O'Donoghue was granted 15s for his having done the duty of Head Attendant in addition to his ordinary duty, during the six weeks' illness of Head Attendant Leo. A sum of £5 was voted.

DEATH OF MRS. KIGGELL.

We deeply regret to report the death of Mrs. Kiggell, wife of Major Launcelot Kiggell, Cahala Cottage, Glin, which sad event took place yesterday afternoon. The deceased lady who had attained a ripe age, had been ailing for some time. The late Mrs. Kiggell was a great benefactress to the poor of the town and district, and her loss will be keenly felt in many an humble home, where the generosity of herself and family often manifested itself. The people of all classes extend their sympathy to Major Kiggell and his family in their present bereavement.

A collision occurred in the Medway yesterday between the London barque Bellevue and the Gunboat Firm, which was at her moorings. Bellevue sank, her crew being taken on board the Firm.

The Coal Miners Convention has accepted the operators' offer of an increase in wages, averaging 12½ per cent., to miners in several States. It is admitted that the result is a victory for the men.

In a fight at McDonald, Georgia, on Sunday, between two whites and a crowd of negroes two of the latter were killed, one was mortally wounded, and eight others were seriously injured, including three women.

It is now definitely stated that the late Crown Princess of Saxony, who appears to have been deserted by the French tutor, Giron, will not be permitted to visit her children, and an application to see one child, who is ill, has been rejected by the Court.

The "Hairdressers' Weekly Journal" vouches for the remarkable length of hair of a Bristol lady. It is 72in., eight inches longer than the lady's height. She wears it plaited and closely twined round her head, so that its length is concealed from the casual observer.

With reference to rumours that there have been revolutionary troubles in Salvador, the Salvador Chamber of Commerce in London informed Reuter's Agency that it has received a cablegram from the Vice-President of the Republic that peace prevails and everybody is now occupied with shipping the coffee crop.

STATE OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

The Press Association says it has been determined that the Court institution of the Royal procession for the occasion of the State opening of Parliament shall be exactly as on the last occasion. The King and Queen will use the State coach, drawn by eight creams, and there will be four other carriages, each drawn by six bays, and one drawn by blacks. The Yeomen of the Guard will add a touch of colour and quaintness to the ceremony, and the Household Cavalry will furnish a field officer's escort. Two mounted esquires will ride beside the State coach.

DEATH OF MRS. WILLIAM SHEEHAN.

Sincere regret is felt by a wide circle of friends at the death of Mrs. Sheehan, widow of the late Mr. William Sheehan, which took place at her residence on Sunday morning. The deceased lady, who had attained the advanced age of 78 years, was mother of Mr. Joseph Sheehan, a well known and talented vocalist. She had a large connection of relatives and friends in city and county, and her practical sympathy with the poor and distressed was ever characteristic of her during her long life.
