## DEATH OF MR. JOHN LAIRD.

We regret to announce the death which took place at his residence, Rathbane Cottage, on Tuesday night, of Mr. John Laird, L.P.S.I., principal of the firm of John Laird and Co., Pharmaceutical Chemists and Druggists, George Street. Mr. Laird started business with his brother in this city early in the sixties. He never took part in public affairs, his nature, indeed, was a most retiring and unassuming one, and his genial manner and unostentatious charity won for him the esteem of all who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was one of the oldest members of the Pharmaceutical Society of Ireland, and a most honoured member of that body. Mr. Laird married Miss Seymour, a member of an old Limerick family, who has predeceased him by some years. Mr. Laird had been in failing health for a considerable time past. He was in his 66th year, and it is a curious coincidence that yesterday was the anniversary of his birth day. He was father of Dr. H. S. Laird, Resident Surgeon at the County Infirmary, to whom, with the other members of the deceased gentleman's family, we tender our sincerest sympathy.

The funeral takes place to-morrow (Friday) at 9 a.m., from his late residence for St. Munchin's Church.
