**WEEKLY SPRING CATTLE AND SHEEP SALES.**

Wm. B. Fitt, Auctioneer, opened the season of these sales of dairy cattle and sheep on to-day. The supply of in calf heifers and cows promises to be a short one in comparison to last year, though there need be no fear that the shortage will be abnormal. The entry for the first day's sale is limited to 50. A most favourable beginning was made with a good attendance, bidding of the brisket character, and nice quality in the stock. The prices will convey the fact that the sale was a highly satisfactory one, and although it was expected that prices would be in advance of last year, still it was not thought that the accentuation would be so marked. The tone was firm throughout, and a ready clearance. The top price of the sale went to Mr. A. Teskey for a nicely shaped heifer, with quality and substance, at £19.8s. 6d. **DEATH OF FATHER LAMBERT.**

We regret to record the death of the Rev. Father Lambert, C.S.S.R., which took place on Thursday evening at Mount St. Alphonsus. The deceased clergyman had attained the patriarchal age of eighty-five years, having been born in 1818 in the County Wexford. He was a man of wonderful energy and zeal, and it was only on Tuesday evening that he became seriously ill. Immediately after Office and Requiem Mass this morning the interment took place at the Redemptorist Church. Last night and to-day the bells of the Church rang out a muffled peal.

**THE PARSLEY BED.**

Parsley suffers from drought in poor soil, and a check sometimes leads to canker or insect attacks. Wood-ashes has a good effect in keeping Parsley free from canker at the collar, and watering with soap-suds tends to prevent attacks from insects. It is too late to sow again now, but it is possible if some of the roots were taken up, dipped in strong liquid-manure, and planted in a frame, they would start away in the fresh soil and make a lot of useful growth. If the plants are cleared where they stand of all discoloured leaves, and well soaked with soot-water, a beneficial change will be effected.

The "Lansing Man," or skeleton, found by a farmer near Lansing, Kansas, United States, and consisting of a skull and some bones, is supposed by Professor Upham to be the oldest proof of man's existence on the American continent. It seems to date from some eight to thirty thousand years ago, but it is not nearly so ancient as European skulls of the Stone Age.
