England and Wales 1,354,500 dols-; Dominion of Canada, 1,016,500 dols.; Ireland, 315,000 dols.; Cuba, 252,000 dols, making a grand total of 90,912,223 dollars. The Irish gifts include—Banbridge library, 5,000 dols.; Cork library, 250,000 dols; Limerick library, 35,000; Newtownards library, library, Waterford 25,000 500 dols. A SURGICAL MARVEL.

A man who was stabled through the heart in a street brawl has just been operated on successfully at the London Hospital. The breast cartilage ribs and lungs were temporarily displaced, the wound in the heart was found and washed, and then sewn up, first with catgut and then with silk. The operation occupied an hour and ten minutes, and immediately after there was a marked improvement in the pulse. The patient continues to progress as favourably as can be expected, and hopes are entertained of his ultimate recovery. The operation, though not unique, is sufficiently remarkable to merit mention.
