A SHOCK PROOF SUIT

Sir Humphry Davy put a wire-gauze envelope
around the miner's lamp, and thus removed the
greatest danger of fire-damp explosions. Professor
Artemieff, of the Kief University, Russia, has
devised a suit of clothes likewise made of wire
gauze which will protect the wearer from electric
shocks of every kind. Wearing such a suit, he
received a shock from a condenser charged to
150,000 volts, and attracted sparks more than a
yard long with his hands, without burning himself
in the least.
