respondent inherited a large fortune. All  
evidence had been called, Mr. Deane, K.C.,  
about to open the case for the other side, when  
Mr. Lawson Walton said he was not in a position  
to call the petitioner to deny the allegation  
against him of misconduct in August, 1901, and  
September, 1902. Sir Francis Jeune, in summing  
up said that the question as to the adultery  
the petitioner would rest with him, and the jury  
would have to decide only the question of  
damages. The jury assessed the damages at  
£25,000. The question as to whether the husband's  
petition is to be dismissed is to be argued to-day.

### THIS DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Mr. Justice Jenne sat all day in the Divorce  
Court to-day to hear the arguments in the  
Constantinidi divorce suit. Counsel for

### A KILLALOE TRESPASS ACTION.

#### THE KING (JOHN CONNORS) V. JUSTICE OF THE PEACE, COUNTY CLARE.

Mr. Lynch (instructed by Mr. Ebrill, solicitor) appeared for an order of certiorari to bring the case before the justices at Killaloe (County Clare) Petty Sessions recently made, whereby the majority of the magistrates (the resident magistrate dissenting) had convicted the defendant in the summons of wilful trespass on a quarry near Killaloe, and fined him 2s. 6d. and 10s. costs. The applicant alleged, by his affidavit, that his brother had paid the rent of the quarry up to September next and that the offence of trespass related to his entering same for the purpose of obtaining materials for the repair of a public road for which he was contracted. The case before the magistrates was really as to whether the rent had been paid or not.

Mr. Justice Boyd—The magistrates surely consider that matter on a complaint for trespass, and you may take a Conditional order.
