THE CASTLECONNELL FATALITY.

A Board of Trade Enquiry was held at Castleconnell to-day by Mr. Armitage into the sad circumstances surrounding the death of the porter Ryan, whose melancholy death and the sorrowful condition of his widow and family has caused such a widespread sympathy locally and otherwise. The proceedings were private. The committee representing the interests of Mrs. Ryan, widow of the late porter, had received no intimation concerning the enquiry, but Rev. Mr. Benson was allowed to be present at his own request, on the distinct understanding that the proceedings were not to be made public. The enquiry concluded at two o'clock.

If that were so, they would soon find that the couple of thousand a year placed by the Government and the city at the disposal of technical instruction would in a short time prove entirely insufficient to carry on the work that the citizens would demand.
