A very serious fire broke out in the premises of Mr. W. J. Doyle, V.S., Enniscorthy, on Tuesday night, doing damage to the extent of £2,000.

Rev. Bartholomew Scanlan, of Castleconnell, County Limerick, parish priest, who died on the 15th May last, left personal estate of the value of £2,046 15s.

On Tuesday the death took place at Kilmaclasha, near Skibbereen, of Michael McCarthy, a small farmer, who had attained the remarkable age of 105 years.

Mr. R. Cussen, solicitor, obtained on behalf of Edward Stanley, a decree for possession of a cottage occupied by Dan Connors, a herdsman, at Newcastle yesterday.

The Rev. Father O'Leary's application to send a child to the Convent Industrial School, was adjourned for preliminary enquiries at Newcastle Petty Sessions yesterday.

A rich vein of marble recently discovered on Lord Midleton's estate, Co. Cork, is being worked, and extensive shipments have been made to England.

Mr. Hickson, R.M., presided at the City Police Court this morning. Two men named Crosby and Walsh, charged with drunkenness last night, were discharged, it being their first offence.

On the application of Mary McCarthy, a poorly-circumstanced woman, Mr. Hickson, at the Police Court this morning, granted a warrant for the arrest of Anne Smyth, on a charge of serious assault.

The monthly meeting of the Limerick No. 2 District Council was adjourned to-day owing to the deaths of the Most Rev. Dr. McBedmond and Mr. Denis Graham, Caherdavin, brother of Dr. Graham, George-street.

The news of the death of the Rev. Father Frost, C.C., Borrisokane, was received in Nenagh yesterday. Deceased was a native of Rossmaghner, Co. Clare. The funeral is at 11 o'clock on Monday at Borrisokane Church.

The marriage will shortly take place of the Hon. Francis Gibson, daughter of Lord Ashbourne, Lord Chancellor, and Mr. Marshall Porter, son of Sir Andrew Porter, the Master of the Rolls.

At the last meeting of the Rathkeale Board of Guardians, Mr. John Cohoon's (Rathkeale) sample of tea was proved by the London tea taster to be the best, and his tender for 16 chests was duly accepted.

At the meeting of the Limerick No. 2 District Council to-day, a resolution was adopted congratulating the Very Rev. Father McInerney, Killaloe, on the result of the action taken by him against the "Irish Times."

The death took place at her residence, I Crest, Whitby, on Thursday, from appendicitis of Sarah Lady Eliot, widow of the late George Wm. Eliot, second Baronet of Sc Hall, Bedale, Yorks.

Having betted in a bar in Paris that would swallow a dozen hard-boiled eggs without drinking, a man named Lefranc, says "Petit Journal," died of suffocation at seventh.

The crew of the abandoned Canadian vessel, who took refuge on St. Paul's I Cape Breton, a fortnight ago, are still waiting to be relieved. The island is uninhabited except by the lighthouse people.

Reuter's agency understands that another expedition is being arranged in Northern Norway against the Yoraghums, a tribe of naked cannibals, inhabiting the hills to the north of the British post of Ofn, on the Benne.

The total indebtedness of local authorities in the United Kingdom amounts to £407,060,000, it having increased during the past eight years by £141,933,184. The National Debt in the same period increased by £96,111,629.

John Mullen, an old man, was remanded to Coatbridge charged with attempting to strangle his wife's throat. It was alleged that the quarrelled while drinking together, and the man accused inflicted a wound extending from the ear. The woman was removed to hospital.

In the will of the late Mrs. Margaret of Cheltenham, whose estate is valued at £251,104, is a direction that her children should be liberally educated, and that they should be brought up to follow some profession or business and "never become idle members of society."

At Worcester, a man named Taylor, sustained serious injuries on himself by tearing himself off on some iron street railings. He then went into the house of a doctor, and taking a knife from a table, stabbed himself. It is feared his wounds will prove fatal. The man has been removed to an asylum.

Private advices received at Berlin on account of a violent outbreak of anti-Semitism at Lompalanka, in Bulgaria. A mob assembled, stormed the Ghetto, pelted the houses, and maltreated the Jews themselves. In some cases the victims were killed.

A series of strange coincidences surrounded the deaths of two aged brothers, Porter, one of whom lived in Farmington, the other at Avon, in Connecticut. Both were taken ill with influenza, and were in bed a week, both dying at 2.30 on the same day. Neither knew that the other was ill.

### ACTION FOR PERSONAL INJURY.
