A large body of the labourers numbering over a hundred, were joined by a big contingent from the Newmarket on Fergus district, and marched two abreast to the Courthouse, where their ranks were swelled by a crowd from Tulla. A number of them succeeded in getting into the Council Chamber, but the majority owing to the exertions of the Constabulary and the Council officials were kept in the outer corridors, while the Council meeting was in progress.

The tenders for road maintenance, which were on the agenda, were mostly from the Ennis district, and in the majority of these, the tendering parties did not answer their names. In half a dozen cases, however, there were responses, and the parties, notwithstanding the opposition of the labour element, who jeered and hooted, signed

their bonds.

A remark from one contractor, a man named Killoughery, directed against Mr. Mat Kelly, led to a very angry scene, and Mr. Kelly also attacked the Chairman for his action in the chair.

#### THE SWIVEL BRIDGE.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SIR-Kindly admit a few remarks as supplementary to the proposal on the above subject, which is now under crucial, or at least critical discussion. An unswinging permanent metal bridge, though not so durable as a stone one, might supplant the existing perishable wooden structure. Multitudes of such are in use, spanning many rivers, or portions of them, in various parts of the three kingdoms, admitting under arches of ordinary elevation steam tugs and passenger boats, the funnels of which are by their mechanical construction instantly lowered when passing. And, surely, the masts of turboats could be as readily manageable. As part of the revenue of the Harbour Board, of course, tolls should be levied proportionate to the size of each craft and the magnitude of its cargo. In the manner suggested a modus vivendi, in the matter, tor the Kilrush Urban Council, the West Clare boatmen, and their honorary advocate, "Liberty." might receive adequate satisfaction, and -what is even more important—the great thoroughfare or viaduct over the regal Shannon should be eased of all impediments.
