

ALCOHOL FROM WOOD.

It announces that he has devised a process of making alcohol from wood, at a reasonable cost, ready for use. All chemists are acquainted with the process, but hitherto the process of making alcohol from wood has been too costly to be of any value. Classens' method the cellulose is converted into sugar, having no use for the wood with it. Sawdust is mixed with steam and water, so that all the steam is absorbed by the gas. A portion of the steam is converted into sugar. This fermentable, remains in the sawdust, is placed in the exhaustion chamber, water passes through them, washes the sugar out.

A method of utilizing sawdust for the production of alcohol has recently been discovered. The sawdust is boiled with water, the liquid matter is pressed out, and the residue is pressed out, and then fermented for several days. The resulting alcohol is purified. After making ample allowance for the loss of spirit, it is said to be about 100 lbs per cwt. of sawdust. This is a new vista of possibilities in the alcohol industry.
