Mr. James Carr proposed, and Mr. Joyce seconded, the following:—"That having heard the report of the Secretary with reference to the interviews with the leading citizens I now move that a special committee, to be called the Executive Committee, be appointed to draft a programme and take any other steps they think necessary which will be laid before the public meeting later on. It was decided to call a meeting of the foregoing at the Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, 29th inst., at 12 o'clock.

Mr. M. J. McNamara proposed, and Mr. Long seconded the following resolution:—"That we, the representatives of the various societies in Limerick pledge ourselves to support Irish industries in our own homes, and use our influence to create a demand for Irish made goods, and that the matter shall be brought before our respective societies, and our fellow-members, regularly reminded of their duty, and urged to practice it."

The resolution was heartily supported by several trade delegates.

Mr. M. McInerney proposed the formation of an Inquiry Committee for the purpose of compiling a list of home made articles, and this was agreed to.

The Committee decided to meet on Monday evening at 7 o'clock in the Gaelic League Rooms, Clare Chambers.

Messrs E. Daly and Normoyle gave some interesting details in connection with woollen and linen trades.

Very Rev. Father McNamara addressed the meeting as to the duty of Irishmen to support their own industries, and said he would do all he could to forward the movement.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to the chairman.

## SUDDEN DEATH.

Albert Ward, aged 35, seaman on board the schooner Louisa (Captain W. H. Sweet) which is discharging a cargo of brick at the quays, died suddenly on board his vessel on Sunday evening. He came aboard about 5.30 and attended prayers with the others of the crew. Subsequently he complained of feeling unwell and died in a short time. Death is supposed to have been due to heart disease. Head Constable Moore investigated the circumstances of the case which were reported to the coroner who did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest.

## STATISTICS OF FAILURES.

According to "Kemp's Mercantile" number of Failures recorded in Ireland week ending April 25th, was 15, Bankruptcy Proceedings, published in Gazette, 3; Deeds of Arrangement filed in Sale Office, 12. The respective numbers for the corresponding week of last year were, Bankruptcy Proceedings, 7—total, 9; increase in Bankruptcies of 10, and a decrease in Deeds of Arrangement in 1903, to date

The number of Bills of Sale published for the same week was 1. The number for the corresponding week of last year was 3, a decrease of 2, being a net decrease in 1903.

The number of Bonds and Judgments for the same week was 43, of which 17 against Traders, and 26 against Farmers and Tradesmen. The numbers in the corresponding week of last year were 14 against Traders, and 28 against Farmers and Tradesmen, showing an increase of 29 against Traders, and a decrease of 2 against Farmers and Tradesmen, being a net decrease in 1903.

### DEBENTURES.

The Mortgages and Charges registered in Ireland during the week ending April 25th, amounted to £6,000. The amount registered in 1903, to the same date, (in addition to the issues in previous years of the same Companies), as compared with the corresponding weeks in 1902,
