BIG FIRES IN ENGLAND.

Early yesterday morning, the castle at Hanley Castle, Worcestershire, was destroyed by fire. The castle, which was a large residence, and contained much valuable furniture, belonged to Sir Edmund Lechmere, and was occupied by Mr. E. Kent, who, with his family, had been living at Torquay for some months.

Earls Barton Grange, Northamptonshire, a fine old residence, occupied by Mrs. Hornsby, was destroyed by fire on Sunday. The damage is estimated at £30,000.
