PROPOSED "SEND-OFF."

At the meeting of the Corporation Committees last night, the Mayor presiding, Councillor M. Prendergast handed in his resignation as a member of the Council, as he is about proceeding, with his family, to the United States, where he intends to reside in future.

This intimation was received with regret by the members present, and it was decided, on the motion of Councillor Donnellan, that all the members and officers of the Council form themselves into a committee for the purpose of presenting Mr. Prendergast with a purse of sovereigns on the occasion of his departure from the city.

The Mayor has consented to act as treasurer, and a meeting of the committee to make arrangements in connection with the movement will be held to-morrow evening in the Council Chamber.
