DEATH OF A LIMERICK '67 MAN.

The death has taken place at his residence, Mountpelier Hill, Dublin, of Mr. Daniel Mullins, where he had resided for the past three years. Deceased had an eventful career. He was one of the Pope's Brigade, and was decorated with two medals—one from Pius IX. and the other from Leo XIII. He also took a prominent part in the '67 movement. He was one of the first members of the Arch-Confraternity, having joined in 1868. He received his jubilee badge in 1893. He was likewise a member of the Third Order of St. Francis in this city, and afterwards in Dublin. He will be best remembered in his capacity as sanitary sub-officer, and later on as caretaker of the Public Baths and the Island Bank.
