

ASKEATON PETTY SESSIONS.

DRUNK IN CHARGE.

Sergeant Barry summoned Michael O'Shaughnessy for being drunk in charge of a horse and car on the 23rd December last. Fined 5s. and costs.

DRUNK AND DISORDERLY.

Constable McDermott summoned James McMahon for being drunk and disorderly. Fined, 10s.

THREATENING HIS MOTHER.

John Horigan was charged with using threatening language towards his mother. The defendant said it was Christmas time, and he was drunk. The case was adjourned for a month.

DRUNKS.

Constable Clancy summoned Michael Riordan for being drunk at Askeaton on the 20th December. Fined 10s. and costs.

Constable Smith summoned James Collins and Dan Sullivan for being drunk and incapable. Fined 1s. and costs each.

Sergeant Cummings summoned Michael Somers for a like offence on the 1st December. Fined 2s. 6d. and costs.

EJECTMENT CASE.

At the Quarter Sessions yesterday before Judge Adams the Kilmalleck Board of Guardians moved for the ejectment of a labourer named Michael Bourke, who, as alleged, took forcible possession of a labourer's cottage.

Mr. Holmes, B.L. (instructed by Mr. Geary), appeared for the guardians.

Mr. P. Kelly, B.L. (instructed by Mr. Fox), for the defence.

For the plaintiff it was argued that the Guardians had by a majority agreed to give the cottage to a man named Irwin. An agreement to this effect was produced.

Mr. Kelly pointed out that this was an ejectment on title, and as a subsidiary tenancy existed, the case should be dismissed.

His Honor said that according to the agreement produced, Irwin was the subsisting tenant, and he should be made the plaintiff in the case, and not the Guardians. He accordingly dismissed the ejectment.

KILRUSH ELECTIONS.

The nominations for four Urban Councillors for Kilrush closed on Tuesday evening at five o'clock, with Mr. John Murphy, Town Clerk, as Returning Officer. The four gentlemen retiring on rotation were—Mr. Thomas Roughan, Co. C, Chairman; Mr. James Clancy, Mr. Michael Carey, and Mr. Patrick Shannon. These gentlemen sought re-election, except Mr. Shannon, who has retired from the contest. The other new candidates nominated in opposition are—Mr. John C. Mahony, J.P.; Mr. Luke O'Brien, Mr. Richard O'Dwyer, Mr. P. J. Dillon, Mr. Michael O'Meara, Mr. Michael O'Shea. Two others were nominated, Mr. J. S. Dowling, and Mr. Daniel Ryan. Thus it will be seen that there are nine candidates for four seats.
