AN EXPERIMENT was made by the Intermediate Commissioners in inspection as a means of correcting, or at least mitigating the calls of mere examinations. It has a move in the right direction; and was wisely thate as it tentative in abure at first. The experiment was a success, and the Commissioners iesol ed to continue it, and the next year they mute a rule that every school should be in per eent of the total result as earned by each school should be paid on the report of the Inspectors. But what happened? Last year there was a partial inspection but no bonus. This year there has been neither inspection nor bonus. although the rule existence, for both is and has - termally been sanctioned the Lord Lieutenant. Why has there een no examination this year? minds Not at Il. But Mr. Wyndham's Government has interposed and refused sanction the appointment of Inspectors, and has cr you the whole Intermediate system back on examinations, and in the face of this Mr. Wyndham stands up in the House of Commons to make a case for a Securalist Department out of the tvis of "a system hased entirely on results." It is the same through the whole extent of Irish education. At the head of it we have

the very Senate of which petitioned the Government to appoint a Royal Commission with a view to reform. That University, too, as you are aware, is a mere examining body.
