CIRCULAR ROAD SEWER.

MR. O'MALLEY HEAVILY FINED.

Yesterday at the City Petty Sessions Mr. Joseph O'Malley, C.E., was summoned to show why he would not abate the recurring nuisance in the North Circular Road, where a sewer is being constructed by him. Mr. Dundon, solr., on behalf of the prosecutors—Corporation, said some time ago Mr. O'Malley arrangement had received permission to make cesspool at the angle of the Circular Road for the purpose of abating the nuisance. The cesspools allowed to overflow and the nuisance continued off was not abated. He (Mr. Dundon) understood that Mr. Goodbody had written to O'Malley stating that if he did not get the cesspool cleaned out he would get it done at his own expense. Mr. O'Malley had written stating would allow him to do so. The order the Corporation now wanted was to have this place cleaned out daily. Mr. Peacocke, City Engineer, stated he wrote Mr. O'Malley on the matter and he authorised him to clear out the place out at his expense. O'Malley had it done so last night, but the place could be filled again in a day. It would require a daily cleaning out. Mr. Hickson said they could not permit people in the district to be poisoned. They would make the order sought and in addition would put a fine of £5 on the defendant and a penalty of £10s each if the nuisance was allowed to exist.
