SAD ACCIDENT AT CORBALLY.

TWO MEN DROWNED.

NARROW ESCAPE OF TWO OTHERS.

A very sad accident, resulting in the loss of two lives and narrow escape of two others occurred yesterday afternoon at the Lax Weir, Corbally. For some days past a number of men in the employment of the Shannon Fishing Company have been engaged preparing for the net fishing season, which opens to-morrow, by putting down gratings and other appliances on the weir. Yesterday, about five o'clock, seven or eight men were employed on the back part of the weir, close to the Clare shore, and four of them, named Patrick Woulfe, James Dundon, Joseph Keegan, and James Moloney, were, it appears, standing on a plank used in connection with the putting down of the gratings. It is alleged that the plank slipped, with the result that three of the men—Woulfe, Dundon, and Keegan—were pitched into the river, and borne off by an extremely strong current. Mr. Clear, foreman, shouted to have a boat near at hand sent to the rescue, and this was at once manned by Woulfe (a brother of one of the parties) and by another fisherman. Meanwhile, Keegan, after being carried down stream a distance of something like one hundred yards, succeeded in getting ashore, but Dundon sank six or seven yards from land before assistance could reach him. Woulfe also disappeared when some sixty yards below the weir. The sad affair was at once reported by Mr. Clear to Acting-Sergeant Wilson at Corbally. Dragging operations were at once carried on till dusk, and again from an early hour this morning several boats were engaged searching in the vicinity of the weir, but so far the bodies have not been recovered, and it may be some time before they are as the river is in very high flood with a very strong fresh on. The deceased were unmarried, Woulfe being 24 and Dundon 25, and they resided at Ardacrusha, Co. Clare. Keegan and Moloney are married men. The latter escaped falling into the water by clutching on to the weir. Mr. Plaque, who only returned from London this morning, heard of the sad affair with deep regret.

We learn as we go to Press that the bodies of the two ill-fated men were found this afternoon.
