### MILITARY FUNERAL.

The mortal remains of the poor young soldier,  
Private Thomas Ellis, of the Army Medical  
Corps, who met his death so tragically at the  
New Barracks on Tuesday morning, were in-  
terred at King's Island at half-past four this  
afternoon. An immense concourse of people  
assembled at the Barrack gate and lined the  
roadways as the cortege passed. A military  
funeral was accorded to the deceased. The  
cortege was headed by a firing party, who  
marched with reversed arms. The band of the  
King's Regiment (2nd Liverpools) followed  
with draped drums, and playing the beautiful  
and solemn strains of Beethoven's Funeral  
March. The coffin was carried on a gun carriage  
drawn by six horses. It was covered with the  
Union Jack, and on it were placed the helmet  
and bayonet of the deceased soldier, and a  
number of beautiful floral wreaths. At each  
side of the gun carriage the members of the  
Army Hospital Corps walked, most of them  
carrying beautiful wreaths. A carriage con-  
taining the relatives of the deceased followed,  
and the cortege was concluded by a detachment  
of the Liverpools. The crowd accompanied the  
remains to the graveyard, where the funeral  
service was impressively read by the Rev. W.  
H. Brown, curate at St. Michael's Church.

At the conclusion of the burial service, the  
firing party fired three volleys over the grave of  
their deceased comrade.
