ALLEGED ASSAULT ON A MASON.

At the City Petty Sessions yesterday, John Mahon, stone mason, summoned Thomas Connors for assault in Queen Street. Connors did not appear, and Mr. C. O'Donnell, solicitor, who represented the complainant, said though the summons was for assault, it had a more serious aspect, inasmuch as the complainant was under police protection. He worked for Mr. George Ryan at the time of the strike, which added to the gravity of the case. A letter was read by the Clerk from Mr. P. E. O'Donnell, solicitor, asking for an adjournment of the case in order that a cross summons would be issued. Mr. Mahon denied there was any understanding of an adjournment. Mr. O'Donnell said since the service of the summons on Connors two men had attacked his client and battered his face. Mr. Mahon was sitting in a public-house in Queen-street, when Connors came up to him and said he had been watching Mahon for a long time, and struck him on the face. The Bench decided to issue a warrant for the arrest of Connors, but Mr. Mahon declining to stay to make a deposition the matter was left over, and the case was adjourned.
