The Lord Lieutenant has accepted the resignation of the Vice-Chancellor, which was recently tendered to him. The New Year dance of the Commercial Club, Ennis, was a great success, seventy couples being present. Eliza Harkins, for assaulting Margt. Duggan, was sent to prison for fourteen days at Ennis yesterday. The Rev. George T. Ward, M.A., formerly of Waterford, has been appointed to the important parish of Eastington, Gloucestershire. The 2nd Battalion of the Royal Munster Fusiliers, stationed at Tramore, are, we understand, under orders to embark for Gibraltar. The popular meeting under the auspices of the South Clare Coursing Club will take place at Danganelly on Wednesday and Thursday, 27th and 28th January. On Tuesday night a fire broke out in the provision shop of Mr. O'Shea, Henry-street, Kilrush. The constabulary succeeded in extinguishing the fire. The Benson-Shapesperian Company staged last night for the first time in Limerick Mr. Stephen Phillips "Paolo and Francesca," and before a delighted house gave a really splendid performance. On the recommendation of the Earl of Belmonte, his Majesty's Lieutenant for County Tyrone, the Lord Chancellor has appointed Mr. James O'Hagan, D.C., Coole House, Clonoe, Co. Wick, to the Commission of the Peace. The meeting of the Technical Committee summoned for yesterday, was not held owing to the want of a quorum, the only members present being the Hon. Miss Spring-Rice and Miss Bourke, with the secretary, Mr. F. A. Hartigan. Sergeant Rogan had a fifteen miles chase on Wednesday after John Bond, wanted on a charge of highway robbery, who bolted at Father Quinn's Lane, and was eventually run down at Ardaraun. The chase lasted five hours, and the culprit was found under a haystack. The Directors of the Munster and Leinster Bank Limited, announce a dividend for the half-year ended 31st December last at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum, free of income tax, the addition of £3,500 to the reserve fund, the placing of £3,500 in reduction of bank premises account, with £5,500 forward. Michael Cleary, Cahercon, applied at Ennis Session yesterday for possession of a labourer's cottage in the Killysart Union, situated in the Ennis Petty Sessions district. The case was adjourned for a month to allow a settlement to be made. FUNERAL OF MRS. PETER FITZGERALD FROM DAY TO DAY

THIS AFTERNOON. The remains of the late Mrs. Fitzgerald, wife of Mr. Peter Fitzgerald, J.P., whose premature demise was so deeply mourned in city and county, were removed from her residence, Mondellilly, at twelve o'clock to-day for interment in the old burial ground at Adare, close to the historic castle of the Deesmonds.

The funeral was, despite the inclemency of the weather, of extremely large proportions, the gentry, tenantry, and labourers of the surrounding districts being present in very large numbers. It was indeed a most eloquent testimony as to the deep and universal regard which is felt at the passing away of a lady who was beloved for her unassuming manner and her unostentatious charity. The coffin, which was strewn with beautiful wreaths (a number of others being placed in the hearse), was borne the entire distance from Mondellilly to the church and thence to the grave by labourers from the Dunraven estate as well as from Mondellilly. Owing to the drivers' strike in Chicago a bride yesterday had to hire a hospital ambulance to go to the church for her wedding.

To-day every French citizen, twenty-one years old, with a six months' residence, and not otherwise disqualified, has the right to vote.

Two big discoveries of ore containing radium have been made in Utah and Idaho by Captain James Lawrence, a geologist and mining expert.

Mr. Arthur Lee, M.P., Civil Lord of the Admiralty, has resigned his position on the Executive Committee of the Tariff Reform League.

M. Marinoni, manager of the "Petit Journal," and the inventor of the rapid printing machine bearing his name, died last afternoon at the age of 80 years.

During last year 247,354 barrels of pickled herrings were exported direct to the Continent from Yarmouth. Ten years ago only 15,911 barrels were sent.

M. Fay, the Engineer of the High Tension Electric Power Company of Thiers has been killed by coming in contact with an electrified saucapan.

Three families living in an old tenement on the quayside at Stockton were found to be suffering from gas poisoning. One man named Thomas Marley, labourer, was dead.

A Reuter's Cape town telegram says—Dr. Jameson has published the draft of a Parliamentary Bill for excluding Asiatics, other than British subjects, from Cape Colony.

Fifteen persons have died of cold in the vicinity of New York during the cold snap of the last three days. There has been a sufficient fall of snow to permit sleighing in Central Park.

It has been decided that the Whitaker Wright case shall stand first in the special jury list for next sittings, which open on the 11th inst., and it will come on before Mr. Justice Bingham.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Francis Joseph McAdam, manager of a Liverpool Building Society, on a charge of forgery and misappropriation, involving about eight thousand pounds.

The Washington correspondent of the "World" learns that Mrs. Maybrick's attorneys have received definite advice that Mr. Akers Douglas, the Home Secretary, has ordered her to be released at Woking next July.

Two months ago a showman who attended the half-yearly pleasure fair at Warrington, introduced smallpox to the town. There resulted an epidemic which has only just been brought to a close. In all seventy cases were reported, and five of the victims died.
