LIMERICK UNION.

ASSISTANT MASTER'S SALARY.

At the Limerick Board of Guardians yesterday a resolution was proposed by Mr. Hassett in reply to the Local Government Board's queries, setting forth reasons why the salary of Mr. Lane, Assistant Master deserved to be increased. It was pointed out that Mr. Lane was in the service of the Board for 11 years. He had now to check over 700 provision dockets weekly for the body of the house, and in addition he has to check six dockets daily for the general fever hospital, a duty that his predecessor had not to perform. It was also pointed out that when Mr. Lane was appointed it was understood he would receive the salary of his predecessor when he became competent.

Mr. Prendergast seconded the resolution. Mr. O'Regan said he did not object to the statement being sent on as drawn up by Mr. Lane, and not as drafted by the Board. The document was a long one, and the members had no opportunity of investigating the correctness of the statement. He proposed as an amendment that it be forwarded as the Assistant Master's statement.

Mr. John Butler seconded the amendment, which on a poll was defeated by seventeen votes to seven.

The Board agreed to send on the document as the expression of the Board.
