DEATH OF THE ARCHDEACON OF LIMERICK.

We announce with very sincere regret the death of the Venerable Frederic Charles Hamilton, M.A., who passed peacefully away at an early hour this morning at his residence, Barrington-street, in the 76th year of his age. For the past few years the ven. gentleman had been in failing health, and for some months past his condition was so weak that he was unable to move out of doors. The sad event, therefore, was not quite unexpected, but nevertheless the news will be received with deep sorrow throughout the diocese of Limerick, with which he has been associated for exactly half a century. Frederic Charles Hamilton graduated in Trinity College, taking out his B.A. degree in 1850, and M.A. in 1854. He belonged to a leading County Dublin family, and was ordained in the Diocese of Down in 1851. The earliest portion of his ministry was spent at Monkstown, and also in Hereford under the Rev. Robert M'Ghie. He came to Limerick during the episcopate of Bishop Griffin, and was appointed Prebendary Vicar-Choral of St. Mary's Cathedral in the year 1854. He was curate of St. Michael's, Limerick, 1859-61, was connected with St. Munchin's, we believe as *locum tenens*, from 1866 to 1868, became Vicar of Brucee in 1868, and in 1869 he was appointed Rector of St. John's, Limerick. In this position he will long be remembered by the older generation. In 1883, on the death of the Ven. E. Jacob, the Rev. then Canon Hamilton was appointed by the late Bishop Graves to the Archdeaconry of Limerick, and soon after the Board of Nomination elected the Rev. gentleman to the vacant Rectorship of St. Michael's, which he has held down to the time of his death. Amongst the various Diocesan offices held by the Ven. gentleman during his long ministerial career were—Prebendary of Doaghmore, 1861-72, when he was succeeded therein by his most attached friend, Rev. F. Meredyth, M.A. (Preceptor), himself one of the oldest surviving clergy in the diocese; Prebendary of St. Munchin's, 1872-78; Preceptor, 1878-83, R.D., 1883-83; Chaplain to the Bishop of Limerick, 1899, and Chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant, 1885-92. He was also Chaplain to the Garrison. Archdeacon Hamilton, until he became enfeebled in health, was a most active and zealous parochial clergyman. In the well-being of his poorer parishioners he ever took a most generous interest; in the cause of education was also conspicuous, and the temperance movement found in him an earnest advocate. As a member of the Diocesan Synod he evinced a keen interest in parochial affairs, and naturally he was a member of the various Committees of the Church, as well also as a representative for many years to the General Synod. He was Secretary for Foreign Missions, and it may be remarked here that his son, the Rev. G. F. Hamilton, recently appointed to a living in County Galway, has spent many years at Chota, Nagpore. Archdeacon Hamilton, too, was for some time Chairman of the Diocesan Clerical Society and a prominent member of the Board of Education. He was Registrar also of the Diocese. Since his appointment to St. Michael's he has done much in the beautifying of the Church, which was thoroughly re-painted and decorated some years ago, and he also had the grounds outside the sacred edifice laid out in the tasteful manner in which we now see them. As a preacher, his attractive, impressive, and eloquent diction made him extremely popular with every congregation of which he was pastor; and in private life he was beloved for his sweetness and amiability of disposition. By all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, the demise of Archdeacon Hamilton is deeply regretted, and widespread sympathy is expressed with his bereaved family in their poignant sorrow. The date of the funeral has not yet been fixed.

HIS FIRST BIT OF EDUCATION.

At the meeting of Limerick No. 1 Council to-day, Mr. Hyland moved that a pump be erected at Caherelly for the use of the children attending school thereat.
