ENNIS F.R.C.S.I.

Dr. T. A. Dillon, of Church Street, Ennis, has just passed his final examination for the degree of F.R.C.S.I. at the Royal College of Surgeons. Dr. Dillon has had a really brilliant student career. In his first year he took second place at the Entrance examination with honours, and second prize for Descriptive Anatomy. In his second year he was prizeman in Descriptive Anatomy and Materia Medica, and in the following year he passed for the Junior Fellowship, and was awarded the Carmichael Medal for Practical Anatomy. In his fourth year he won the Gold Medal for Pathology and was appointed Demonstrator in Anatomy; and in his final year he won the O'Bryen Bellingham medal in clinical medicine and was appointed House Surgeon to St. Vincent's Hospital, which position he held to the end of 1903, when he was appointed Ship Surgeon under the P. and O. Company, which he held for over twelve months when he successfully competed for the important position of Medical Superintendent in the Croydon Union Hospital, which contains no fewer than 408 beds. His next honour was the brilliant examination he has just passed. We congratulate Dr. Dillon, and wish him every success in his professional career.

LATE ARCHDEACON HAMILTON.

There is just now being placed over the grave of the late Archdeacon Hamilton in St. Mary's Cathedral graveyard, a marble box tomb, with a border of cut limestone. On the right handside is the inscription, "In loving memory of Frederick Charles Hamilton, Archdeacon of Limerick, and Rector of the Parish of St. Michael; born 28th December, 1828; died 4th June, 1904." At the foot is the inscription, "God is love." The work was executed by Messrs. G. W. Harrison, Great Brunswick street, Dublin, and Messrs. T. O'Doherty and Sons, Bridge street, Limerick.
