### DEATH OF MR RICHARD PLUMMER.

It was rumoured in town this afternoon that Mr. Richard Plummer had died to-day in Dublin. On making inquiries we regret to learn that the intelligence is correct. Mr Plummer had been in delicate health for some time past, and some days ago successfully underwent an operation in Dublin. He was progressing favourably until a relapse set in yesterday, and, as already stated, he passed away this morning. Mr Plummer's name was, it may be said, a household word in golfing circles throughout Ireland, he having been secretary of the Lahinch Golf Club since its inception, and no better man could have filled the position. He was a most ardent votary of the game, and in addition took the greatest interest in making the club the great success that it was. In the Irish Industrial movement Mr. Plummer did yeoman's service, having been for many years Secretary of the Limerick Branch, while in commercial life he was very prominently known as private secretary of Mr. A. W. Shaw, J.P. Whether in public or private life Mr. Plummer was always the same able, kind, courteous, and general—a man who was always accessible no matter what the pressure of work devolving on him might be. The news of his death at the early age of 43 years will occasion poignant sorrow amongst a wide circle of friends, and we tender our sincere sympathy to his widow and relatives in their great sorrow. Mr. Plummer, who was the eldest son of the late Major Fitzgerald Plummer, of Mount Plummer, in this county, began life in the Provincial Bank, then several years ago becoming private secretary to Mr. Shaw.

### DEATH OF MR. GEORGE J. HEWSON, M.A.

We regret to observe the announcement of the death of Mr. George James Hewson, M.A., of Hollywood, County Limerick, which took place on Sunday last in the 78th year of his age. The deceased gentleman was an eminent authority on Irish antiquities in general, and especially with all that concerned the castles, abbeys, and historical sites in the County Limerick. He was a frequent contributor to the Press, and various papers of his have appeared from time to time in the journal of the Royal Archaeological Society.
