'MODEL' FATHERS.

Magistrate's Sessions yesterday. Acting
Magistrate, Boherbuoy, charged James
McDonagh, of Birmingham's Lane, Carey's Road,
to his five children, by putting
them in the street at a quarter to twelve on
last night. The case for the prosecution
was that the man came home drunk, and that
he refused to go for the police. The sergeant
detained Bourke, but without result,
and the children outside the door at the
time, and one of them was
born. Prisoner's wife is
ill. Complaint was made that he gave
himself out of his £1 a week's earnings.
He earned only 17s 6d. He com-
mitted his clothes were pawned. The
Magistrate reserved the case for a month and
prisoner to find bail by to-morrow
morning in £10, and two sureties of £15
each for months imprisonment.
Magistrate charged the Prevention of Cruelty
Society charged Joseph Kirkland, dock
street, Keffe's Lane, with neglecting
to provide for four young children. Mr. Hall,
appeared for the prosecution. The
Magistrate, the police and the Society's
Magistrate stated that when the
case came under the influence of drink,
she tried to "fly out of the house" with her
children. Mrs. Kirkland made an appeal to the
Magistrate to adjourn the case, it being
the Christmas time, and finally a majority of the
Magistrate led to postpone the matter for a
month. Mr. Hall, solicitor, observed that it had
been stated that this was a prosecuting society,
and stated out that it was only after
several warnings that they took action before
prosecuting. Mr. Bourke, J.P., said that
the case was well-known.
