The text was issued to-day of the Convention between the United Kingdom and China respeeting the employment of Chinese labour in British Colonies and Protectorates. The Convention, which is to remain in force for four years, comprises fifteen Articles. For the better protection of the interests and the wellbeing of emigrants, Article 6 empowers China to appoint Consuls or Vice-Consuls; and in Lord liansdowne's suggestion that these officers should be experienced men of Chinese nationality the Chinese Government readi'y acquiesced.
