A "WEE BLANKET."

Two respectably dressed little boys named Michael Benson and James Hayes, about nine years of age, were charged with the larceny of a military blanket from the New Barricks on the 23rd. Sergeant Thompson, King's Liverpool Regiment, stated that the occurrence was reported to him, and Hayes brought the blanket to him. Acting Sergeant Kelly deposed to having followed the boys through "Jackey the Lad's lane." Hayes gave him the blanket. Benson said that it was the other boy who took the blanket, and the other said that Benson was as bad as him. The witness assumed that the boys got over a wall and took the blanket which was hanging from one of the dormitory windows.

In answer to Mr. Counihan, who defended, witness said the blanket was only value for 1s.

Benson said that Hayes went in after a ball, and that he swung out of the blanket, which, broke.

Hayes made a similar statement.

Mr. Hickson said he considered the two boys equally guilty, but on account of their tender years he would not send them to gaol. He discharged them with a caution, and warned their parents to look after them.

STREET OBSTRUCTION.

Sergeant Beatty summoned four young men named James Dwyer, Edward Skehan, Michael Mitchell, and James O'Brien for causing an obstruction on the public thoroughfare on last Sunday night.
