THE CORBALLY DROWNING ACCIDENT.

BODY RECOVERED.

The body of the man William Meehan, 50, who
 lost his life by drowning in the Shannon at Cor-
 bally Weir, while working thereat, about five
 weeks ago was found floating down the river op-
 posite Howley's slip by two fishermen
 named Tyrrell. The remains which were in an
 advanced stage of decomposition, were removed
 to the morgue. Since the fatality two sons of
 the deceased have been engaged grappling for the
 body, and on Monday it was rumoured that it had
 been recovered some distance from where the man
 fell into the river. Deceased was married and had
 a large family living in Mary-street.

THE INQUEST.

An inquest was held in the City Courthouse
 to-day by Mr. Coroner DeCourcy.

Head-Constable Moore conducted the inquiry
 for the Crown.

William Meehan, son of the deceased, deposed
 that his father was in the employment of Mr.
 Place, Corbally, for the past thirty-five years,
 and was a carpenter by trade.

Patrick Clear, foreman in Mr. Place's employ-
 ment, deposed that deceased was a sober, trust-
 worthy man. He gave the details, already pub-
 lished as to how the accident occurred. The men
 Hogan and McMahon who were in the boat with
 deceased, saved themselves by swimming, and
 immediately witness had a boat put out to the
 assistance of deceased, but he made no effort to
 catch her. He sank in about two minutes after
 falling into the river. The gondola was as safe,
 and even safer than the keel boat.

Mr. Fitt, who appeared for the Limerick
 Shannon Fishing Company, of which Mr. Place is
 Manager.

Asked what the length of this boat was?
 The witness said about 24 feet long. It was
 the kind of boat that was in use for the past
 twenty-four years. Witness was an experienced
 man about boats.

In reply to Mr. Kenny, solr., who represented
 the next-of-kin witness stated there was no tide
 when the accident occurred. The fatality took
 place a little after twelve o'clock, and the water
 high as it was all this year.

Patrick McMahon, Achnacrusha, one of the men
 who was employed in removing this grating,
 stated he considered the boat they were using for
 that purpose in every way suitable. He was
 precipitated into the water with deceased but
 saved himself by swimming to the shore.

James Tyrrell, a ferryman, deposed to the
 recovery of the body.

Dr. Graham stated that death was due to
 drowning.

Mr. J. A. Place said he considered the boat an
 absolutely safe one for the purpose to which it
 was converted on that day.

To the Coroner—The deceased had been
 engaged in this sort of work during the 27 years
 in which he had been manager of the company. A
 boat would be better than a lifebuoy in this cir-
 cumstances. He was in the same predicament
 himself on one occasion, and held on to the side
 of a boat.

Mr. Fitt said that there had not been an
 accident at the weir for the past 35 years until
 this one and that sometime before when two men
 were drowned.
