Deceased was unmarried and belonged to the County Limerick.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.—At the request of the Down, Cork and Dromore Committee of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel amongst the heathen, I have pleasure in sending you the resolution unanimously passed at their yesterday. It was proposed by the Rev. Canon B. D., Vicar of Derrinagh, and seconded by the Rev. Canon Stephenson, LL.D., Vicar of Dromore, the Very Rev. the Dean of the Diocese presiding:—"That we the members of the Diocesan Committee having read in the Press of the indignities practised to the Jewish congregation in Limerick city, and protesting against the perpetration of such as antagonistic to the teaching of Christ and alien to the character of Irishmen, beg to tender to the Rabbi and Hebrew community in Limerick our sincere sympathy in their intolerance and unmerited treatment received in a land hitherto singularly free from anti-Semitic prejudices."
