GREAT MAY FAIR.

AT NEWCASTLE WEST.

(From our own Correspondent.)

There was a good supply all round, and every department filled well, with one exception, and that was beef, which was not equal to the demand, beef cattle being scarce just now. It was quick, keen and business-like, the rush and expeditious purchases in good quality strippers, two year olds and yearlings, which occurred in the early morning, and pleasing from the farmer's point of view that prices were well maintained. One of the largest buyers, Mr. Ratcliff, of Co. Meath, informed me the prices paid were as good as at any recent fair, and were exceeded in some instances, which ought to destroy the mania some farmers have of bringing their cattle to far off fairs at considerable expense, and frequently selling at a low price. Best beef sold at 6d. per cwt.; inferior sorts from 5d. to 6d. Mutton sold at from 8d. to 9d. per lb. Strippers of good quality sold quickly at from £10 10s. to £12 10s.; second class, £8 to £10. Two-year-olds sold at from £10 to £11 10s.; yearlings, £6 to £8 10s., and “cull’d” sorts at smaller prices. In-calf cows and heifers sold at from £12 to £16. Prices all round were well maintained, and there was a good supply. Figured the previous day at 45s. per cwt.; bonhams, 22s. 6d. to 27s. 6d. each; stores, 35s.
