

IRISH INDUSTRIES ASSOCIATION.

At a meeting of the Irish Industries Association at the Chamber of Commerce this afternoon Mrs. J. B. Barrington presiding, the action of the County Technical Committee in refusing £60, being an increased annual grant to the Irish Industries was discussed. Mr. Shaw made a statement showing that the conditions of the grant had been complied with by the Association, and that money from the County Committee was spent in prizes, and distributing sittings of eggs. That the three gentlemen nominated by the County Committee to represent them on the Committee of the Industries Association were duly elected, and notice of each meeting sent to the gentlemen in question.

After some discussion it was decided that Mr. Shaw's statement of the matter already sent to Father Casey, who was kindly disposed to the Association, be sent also to the Secretary of the County Committee, and that the latter be asked to reconsider their decision with respect to the grant.
