## TEACHER RETIRES.

Another of our highly successful teachers, Mr. M. J. Devine, retires from the public service to enjoy a well-earned rest, says the "Kilrush Herald." For nearly forty years Mr. Devine has been Head Teacher of the Kilkee National School. And indeed, it goes without saying, that seldom did a more pains-taking or more successful teacher serve any community. His pupils by scores may be reckoned among the learned professions, the Civil Service, the local teachers and local merchants, in the Constabulary, and in other walks of life. We shall be much surprised if the opportunity is allowed to pass without a proof, on the part of his former pupils at least, of their appreciation of his past services. In his retirement we sincerely wish Mr. Devine many years of happiness.

Viscount Wolseley has written to a correspondent stating that if he can foresee anything in the future with confidence it is that we shall have to adopt, whether we like it or not, some system of compulsory service. The army we can afford to pay at the moderate sum at which which we now remunerate our soldiers is not, and will not be, sufficiently large, he says, for the military assistance of our great Empire. The only alternative therefore is some system of compulsory service.

## STATISTICS AND FAILURES.

According to "Kemp's Mercantile Gazette" the number of Failures recorded in Ireland during the week ending October 15th, was 14, viz:—New Bankruptcy Proceedings, published in the "Dublin Gazette," 7; Deeds of Arrangement filed at the Bills of Sale Office, 7. The respective numbers in the corresponding week of last year were: Bankruptcies, 2; Deeds of Arrangement, 12—total, 14; being a net increase in Bankruptcies of 22, and a net decrease in Deeds of Arrangement in 1904, to date, of 51.

The number of Bills of Sale published in Ireland for the same week was 3. The number in the corresponding week of last year was 6, showing a decrease of 3, being a net increase in 1904, to date of 2.

The number of Bonds and Judgments published for the same week was 44, of which 14 were against Traders, and 30 against Farmers and non-Traders. The numbers in the corresponding week of last year were 24 against Traders, and 15 against Farmers and non-Traders, showing a decrease of 10 against Traders, and an increase of 15 against Farmers and non-Traders, being a net increase in 1904, to date, of 175.

The Mortgages and Charges (Debentures) registered by Limited Companies in Ireland during the week ending October 15th, amounted to £600. The total amount registered in 1904, to the same date, was £110,815 (in addition to the issues in previous years by the same Companies), as compared with £641,442 for the corresponding weeks in 1903.
