

IN AN INFANTICIDE.—BABY'S BODY FOUND IN THE RIVER.

On Sunday the body of a male child was taken out of the slob at Arthur's Quay by Michael Russell and Constable Leo, who had it removed to the morgue in a tin box awaiting an inquest. At one o'clock yesterday Mr. Coroner DeCoucey and a jury, of which Mr. Benjamin Barker was foreman, held an inquest on the remains in the City Courthouse. Head Constable Moore conducted the proceedings on behalf of the authorities, and after formal evidence of the finding of the body had been taken, a post mortem was held by Drs. Graham and Mulcahy, whose joint testimony showed that death had taken place prior to immersion in the water, where the remains had been for at least three days. It approximately lived three hours after birth, and death was due to neglect and exposure. A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence was returned.
