MASONIC SERVICE

AT ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL.

The Annual Masonic Service was held last
evening in St. Mary's Cathedral, and was as
usual an event of considerable interest and
impressiveness. There was a large and repre-
sentative attendance of the members of the Blue or
Craft Masons from the various lodges in North
Munster, as also Provincial Grand Lodge officers,
Royal Arch Masons, Knights Templar, and Prince
Masons. The Provincial Grand Master and the
Deputy Provincial Grand were present. The
brethren robed in the Jebb Chapel, and then
advanced in processional order to the seats
specially reserved for them in the transepts,
while the Knights Templars, in their flowing
robes, occupied seats near the stalls, and formed
an arch of steel as the Provincial Grand Master
and his Deputy passed under same. The service
was, of course, special to the occasion, and the
music was excellently rendered by the Cathedral
choir, Mr. Muspfatt presiding at the organ. The
processional hymn was 379, the anthem "Behold
how good and joyful," the hymn before sermon
336, and the hymn during offertory 39. The
officiating clergy were Rev. H. Orpen, Rev. E.
Archdall, and Rev. C. V. Atkinson, who read the
lesson.

The Lord Bishop preached a very impressive
and touching discourse appropriate to the occa-
sion, taking his text from the 105th Verse of the
119th Psalm, "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet
and a light unto my path." The offertory was in
aid of the Masonic Orphan Schools. The Bene-
diction, pronounced by the Bishop, was followed
by the "Three-fold Amen." The National
Anthem was then sung by the choir and congrega-
tion, and then after the clergy and choir had
withdrawn, the brethren re-formed and returned
to the Jebb Chapel. The Masonic procession was
the largest seen at any similar service for several
years past. A considerable number of the general
public was also present.

ANOTHER FACTORY FATALITY.

YOUTH FEARFULLY MANGLED.

A melancholy accident, involving the loss of
life, occurred to-day at the bacon-curing factory
of Messrs J. Matterson and Sons, Limited. At
about a quarter past twelve a young fellow
named William Young, 17, who was employed
in the sausage department, was in the act of
throwing a belt off a pulley when his clothes
got entangled in the machinery. He was taken
round the wheel several times and killed.
When extricated from the machinery life was
found to be extinct. He sustained compound
fracture of both legs, as well as injuries to the
head. Dr. Myles, the factory surgeon, was
communicated with, and when he arrived on
the scene a few minutes after the occurrence,
Young appeared to be beyond human aid. The
Coroner has been advised of the fatality, and an
inquest will be held.
