The latter deposed that he had £12 in notes as well as 16s. Id. in small change and a silver lever watch in his possession on the 13th. He became intoxicated, and on recovering his memory found that the money and watch disappeared. Accused has been returned for trial to Clonmel Quarter Sessions to be held on the 24th prox.

Mr. N. A. Bergin writes complaining of the want of support for Irish manufactures which he has found existing among shopkeepers of some country towns which he has recently visited. He gives many details, including Belgian matches, hop bitters, starch, and hats. With regard to the latter, he says that although the shopkeeper sold it to him as Irish, he would be willing to make a small bet with the proprietor of the establishment that the material was foreign, and that the hat was not stitched in Ireland
