As the coffin was being borne up the aisle of the Cathedral the hymn, "O kest in the Lord," was sung, after which the Rev. Mr. Swain read the 90th Psalm and the Lesson. At the con-clusion, of the service the Archdeacon of Aghadoe paid a touching tribute to the memory of the deceased. He said Mr. Boyd, who had been before the people of St. Michael's Parish and the other parishes of the city for so many years, had surely led a life of consistent holiness.
