NEWS OF THE WEEK

MONDAY.

Very Rev. Canon Hegarty, P.P., Clonmire,
died suddenly on Saturday morning.

On Sunday evening, 4th June, a concert was
held at Corofin Female National School. A
number of popular local vocalists were present.

On Saturday last the funeral took place of
Colonel Charles Deane, J.P., Gurrane, Fermoy,
late 3rd Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers, and
was one of the largest ever seen in the Fermoy
district.

Angling at Lough Corrib with artificial flies—
