### A FATAL QUARREL.

Last night a quarrel took place at Texteth Dock, Liverpool, between a labourer named William Edward Hitchen and a timekeeper named Thomas Williams. The latter refused to allow the former to resume work, because he was late, and during the quarrel Williams was, it is alleged, struck, and falling into the dock from the force of the blow, was drowned. Hitchen has been remanded.

### FUNERAL OF MR. CUSACK D.I.

The funeral of the late Mr. Cusack, District Inspector, took place at Rathkeale on Saturday. The cortege was large and representative proving the high esteem in which the deceased officer was held and the widespread regret which is felt at his premature demise.
