Hannan an application was granted for the release of the defendant, Patrick Hannan, a Limerick man, where he had been imprisoned for contempt of Court, for non-compliance with the order of the Court, whereby he was directed to make a proposal to the Receiver to become his holding pending the hearing of the case to give possession thereof.

CITY LABOURER'S TRAGIC DEATH

At half-past four o'clock yesterday evening a melancholy fatality, involving the death of a labourer named Michael Downes, White's Lane, occurred in Upper Cecil Street. At the time stated the unfortunate man was engaged with others in affecting some repairs to the house No. 17 by means of a ladder, resting on a plank projecting from a window at a height of 50 feet from the ground. Downes, it is stated, was standing on this ladder, and while in the act of hanging a new chute, the old one on which he had his hand for support, suddenly gave way with the result that he fell into the back yard of No. 18, where on being picked up life was found to be extinct. The body was shortly afterwards removed in the Fire Brigade Ambulance to the house of deceased awaiting an inquest.

THE INQUEST.—CONFLICTING EVIDENCE.

An inquest was held on the remains at noon to-day by Mr. Coroner DeCoursey at Messrs. Mannix's Billiard Rooms, Upper Cecil Street. Head Constable Walsh represented the Crown; and Mr. J. P. Hall, solr., appeared for Mr. P. Mannix, the owner of the premises off which deceased fell; and Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, for the next-of-kin.

Norah Downes, wife of the deceased, said when her husband left home at one o'clock he was sober and in his usual good health.

Joshua Fitzgerald, Henry-street, plasterer and slater, was the next witness called. His evidence went to show that the plank on which the ladder rested was secure—so secure as that he would have no hesitation in going up to do the work which the deceased was engaged on when he fell off.

The witness was cross-examined by Mr. O'Sullivan as to whether the deceased was employed by him or Mr. Mannix. Witness said he worked at the rate of 5s. 4d. per day, on this occasion for Mr. Mannix; but in reply to Mr. Hall, subsequently denied this.

The Coroner said it was very hard for him to discriminate between what the witness swore now and what he swore a moment ago. He stated a while ago that he was paid 5s. 4d.

The witness in further reply to Mr. Hall said there was never a word about 5s. 4d.

By Mr. O'Sullivan—He would not swear that Mr Mannix paid him by the job before.

Constable Michael Breunan, who lives at No. 17 Upper Cecil street, stated he saw the scaffolding immediately after the accident. It was the same then as it was now. The ladder was fastened in two places.

Dr. Shanahan deposed that death was due to shock, as the result of external injuries to the chest, and probably to internal causes.

This was the extent of the evidence given, and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony.
