Defendant—Well, no. He could not tell what condition the milk was in when it reached the creamery.

Maggie Jordan examined—She milked the cows on the 19th of July and prepared the tankards; there was no water in them and she put no water in them; and her master did not do anything to the milk; she delivered it to the creamery and did nothing to it.
