## SAD FATALITY AT BALLYBUNION.

We regret to have to record a very sad accident  
attended with fatal results which occurred at  
Ballybunion, County Kerry, on Saturday. It  
would appear that Master Patrick L. Dundon, son  
of Mr. John Dundon, solicitor, Limerick, whose  
family have been staying for some weeks past at  
this watering place, fell off the cliff, and received  
such injuries as resulted in his death on Saturday  
night. The deceased, who was fifteen years of  
age, was, it appears, alone at the time of the  
accident, and was picked up some time later. He  
was a bright and promising boy, and great  
sympathy is expressed in Limerick and elsewhere  
with Mr. and Mrs. Dundon in their sorrow. The  
funeral took place yesterday afternoon at the  
family burial place, Clunana, Co. Limerick.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL CASE.

### FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

Sergeant Edward O'Brien summoned Thomas  
Shanahan, Glenquin, under the Food and Drugs  
Acts for supplying milk to the Glenmore  
Creamery which contained 8.9 per cent. of added  
water.

Defendant's wife stated she had but one cow,  
and the milk was sent as it came from the cow.

Mr. Roche, C.P.S., said she should be sworn,  
and handed her the book.

Witness said she never took an oath in her  
life, and declined to take it now.

Fined 1s, 5s costs, and 2s extra costs.

Sergeant O'Brien charged Eneas Mulcahy, of  
the Commons, with supplying milk to the same  
creamery which contained 18 per cent. of added  
water.

Mr. Liston, solicitor for defendant, said of  
course they knew the evidence of the analyst  
was only prima facie. Sir Charles Cameron  
may never have seen this sample, and it was  
easy for an error to creep in, where there are  
thousands of samples every day.

Eneas Mulcahy, defendant, examined, said he  
was sending milk for years to Mr. Collins  
creamery at Glenmore, and there was never a  
complaint. He milked the cows with his  
servant, and put the milk into the tankards, and  
the girl took it to the creamery. He swore he  
did not interfere in any way with the milk; it  
was put into the tankards as it was taken from  
the cows.

Sergeant O'Brien—Did you examine the  
tankard before putting the milk into it?

Defendant—Well, no. He could not tell what  
condition the milk was in when it reached the  
creamery.

Maggie Jordan examined—She milked the  
cows on the 19th of July and prepared the  
tankards; there was no water in them and she  
put no water in them; and her master did not  
do anything to the milk; she delivered it to the  
creamery and did nothing to it.

Mr. Liston contended there was no case  
whatever against his client. They should con-  
sider his character; the letter read from M.  
Collins, and the positive evidence that no water  
was used or anything improper done to the milk.  
He asked for a dismissal.

Sergeant O'Brien said he gave defendant  
sample of the milk, and he could have got  
analysed if he wished.

Mr. Hurley said he was not adjudicating being  
a member of the County Council.
