THE W JAPS IN SAK

Russians Retreat

The following message has been received from the Japanese Legation:—The Sakhalin army reports that at 1 p.m. on July 24th proved to be the first alcova and occupied the pier from Polowinka to the sea. The enemy in that direction consisted of a battalion and some volunteer field guns. The enemy fled to the pier of Alexandrov, where they were trying to burn. That detachment taking possession of the pier. The enemy's repeated attacks were also occupied by our troops. The enemy in co-operation with three p.m. one detachment occupied the alcova, while another detachment of the enemy succeeded in occupying Alexandrov at 7.15 p.m. The resistance from a redoubt east of Alexandrov was also from the heights north of Alexandrov. At dawn of July 25 we resumed operations and pressed the enemy up to No. 1. The same day Dove fell into our hands and Alexandrov escaped. We captured 200 prisoners.

BATTLESHIP IN GIBRALTAR
