ROYAL MOVEMENTS.

(By Telegraph To-day.)

The King left London this morning for Newmarket. His Majesty returns to town to-morrow at the conclusion of the racing.

The Princess and Prince of Wales left Victoria Station, London, by special train at eleven forty-five this morning for Dover en route to Calais and Genoa, where they embark on the "Renown" for India. The King, Queen, Princess Victoria, and a distinguished company, assembled to see their Royal Highnesses off, among them being Mr. Broderick, Secretary for India, and Lord Lansdowne. Their Majesties took an affectionate farewell of the Prince and Princess, and as the train steamed out a cheer was raised.

The Prince and Princess on arriving at Dover were met by a representative of the military and civil authorities. The landing stages were gaily decorated, and large crowds of people gathered on the pier before the steamship "Invicta" left for Calais.

The Princess smilingly remarked about the photographers who were busy taking snapshots of the scene.

At 1.36 the vessel left amid the cheers of the crowd. A choppy sea was running, foreshadowing a rough voyage.

SERIOUS FIRE NEAR THE CITY.

Extensive Damage to Property.

Yesterday morning at about eight o'clock the steward of Mr. S. F. Dowling, J.P., discovered that two large ricks of hay in a haggart on his employer's farm at Temple Mungret were on fire. Efforts were at once made by the servants, neighbours, and Ballinacurra police to extinguish the flames, and the Corporation Fire-Brigade was telephoned for. Captain Hayes and his men with the manual engine were out in quick time, but owing to the absolute insufficiency of a water supply were powerless to subdue the conflagration. The two ricks, which contained in all some 350 tons were burning during the day and have been practically consumed, while a shed in which there was one rick was also destroyed. A third rick quite close at hand had a very narrow escape. A claim for compensation will, it is understood, be lodged. The damage is estimated at £1,000.

Attack on a Publican.

Impressive Ceremony.

Yesterday the remains of the late very Rev. Dean Flanagan were interred in the Parish Church, Adare, amid every manifestation of regret for one who had during his ministry in the diocese constituted himself a friend of the poor, and a popular clergyman with all classes and sects.

The body was enclosed in a polished oak coffin, and since the previous night had rested on a catafalque in front of the High Altar. Yesterday morning at 11 o'clock office for the dead was celebrated, and immediately after a solemn Requiem High Mass at which His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer presided was sung in presence of a very large congregation, which included, among several of those who were not co-religionists of the late Dean, the Countess Dunraven and Lady Eileen Wyndham-Quin. Owing to absence from the country, the Earl of Dunraven, a life-long friend of the deceased clergyman, was unable to attend the obsequies. At the conclusion of the ceremonies the body was laid to rest in front of the high altar, in juxtaposition to the sepulchre of the late Dean's predecessor, the Rev. Father O'Grady. The church was draped in black as a mark of respect for the dead pastor, and all over the village the people showed their veneration in the aspect of their houses, which were closed and blinds drawn.

OUTDOOR RELIEF.

There were several cases for admission to outdoor relief. The Chairman and other Guardians pointed out that relief was very high, and every effort should be made to keep it down. In one case the Master said the parties and their ancestors were constantly in the house. Alderman Donnellan asked what was to be done when work was not to be had outside.

Mr. C. M'Namara asked would he be in order in moving that there should be a divisional charge for outdoor relief.

The Chairman said not.

Mr. Donnellan (to Mr. M'Namara)—I think we will get you appointed member of Parliament (laughter).

Mr. M'Namara—I might be as good a one as Tom Donnellan any way (laughter).

Chairman—You would be both good men.

Mr. C. M'Namara said the relief in the city had gone up in three years a thousand year. If there was a divisional charge it would not be such.

The Chairman was sorry that when the Local Government Act was passed, the divisional charge was not left as it was, because it was a great hardship on the country to have to support a lot of people from the city.

The matter dropped.

MURROE DISPENSARY RESIDENCE.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Board of Works referring to the Clerk's letter of the 3rd instant, inquiring whether defective material was actually used in the construction of Murroe Dispensary residence, and in reply I am to state that on the date of the Surveyor's visit the damp course had been laid on the east, west, and south walls of the residence, and the sample taken by him on that date was a typical one of the inferior material being used. I am to add that the material on the site for the damp course was exactly the same as that used in the above-mentioned walls. As to the lime mortar referred to in the Board's letter of the 16th ult., it was found that the masons were using the weak stuff stated.

Mr. Bourke said that this was quite opposed to what Mr. Holmes said—that there was none of this material used at all, and that he stopped it. They had it on the authority of the Inspector that it was actually used when he was on the ground.

Mr. Mulcahy understood that Mr. Holmes caused it to be removed.

It was suggested that the matter be referred to Mr. Holmes for a written report.

Captain O'Brien—Refer it to the Engineer.

In answer to Mr. O'Regan, the Clerk said that Mr. Holmes's time at the Board of Works was up to-day.

The Chairman said perhaps when the Engineer came to report he would say the whole thing had been carried out regularly.

The matter was referred to the Board's Engineer for report.

SUBSTITUTES' REMUNERATION.

The Local Government Board wrote sanctioning payment at the rate of ten shillings a week to Mrs. Nix for her services as temporary substitute for Mrs. Murphy during that officer's illness. Also payment at the rate of £1 a week to Mrs. O'Neill for discharging the duties of Miss Forrest, hospital accountant, during that officer's absence through illness.

"A DISTINCTION WITHOUT A DIFFERENCE."

The Local Government Board wrote stating that they were not aware of any enactment which would authorise the Guardians to expend any portion of the Union funds in sending an inmate to Dublin to visit her child in the Blind Asylum.

The Master asked how it was the Local Government Board sanctioned payment of expenses of women who were sent down to Glin to see their children? (Hear, hear.)

Captain O'Brien asked was the woman in this particular case an inmate?

Master—She was an inmate.

Captain O'Brien—That's the point.

The Board made an order to the effect that they considered the same principle should apply in this case as in Glin.
