FUNERAL OF DEAN FLANAGAN.

Impressive Ceremony.

Yesterdzy the remains of the late very Rev. Deag Flanagan were interred in the Parish Church, Adare, amid every manifestation of regret for one who had during his ministry in the diocese constituted himself a friend of the poor and a popular clergyman with all classes and sect.
