The Earl of Fingall, the new Master of the Horse to the Irish Viceroy, is a Catholic peer, like his predecessor, the Earl of Kenmare. Lord Fingall, who was in the Imperial Yeomanry in the Boer War, has been a Viceregal official before his appointment as Master of the Horse. He was State Steward during Earl Spencer's second Viceroyalty.

Six hundred and twenty one tourists from the Lancashire districts visited Killarney on Tuesday. The Great Southern and Western Railway arrangements were very satisfactory.

Captain Harkness, of Cahara Cottage, Glin, received a wire on Tuesday, at 8 p.m., announcing that peace had been proclaimed between Russia and Japan. The intelligence caused the liveliest satisfaction to all.
