The river was thickly dotted with small boats, bringing their jocund freights, and the other side was one mass of people, interested in the races never flagged. The finer elements which conduce to a happy occasion of a function such as the City Regatta were not wanting, if we exclude the regard for punctuality shown both on Monday and Wednesday. The first event was the start at 3.30 sharp, but it was 4.15 when the boats left the stakes, and the close of the proceedings did not arrive until 8.15. The programme announced the starting time at 6.15. This was not a very convenient state of things, taking into consideration the inconvenience caused to those crews who had to get to Waterford for the regatta though it is rather late now to pour out the water on the want of time-keeping.
