CITY FATALITY.

The Inquest

Mr. Coroner DeCoursey and a jury, of which Mr. James Bourke was foreman, held an inquest to-day on the remains of an old woman named Mary Vaughan, of Hourigan's lane, formerly a cook, who met her death on Thursday night by falling down the staircase of her house.

Sergeant Beckett conducted the inquiry, and the evidence adduced by Catherine Hanley and Margaret Moloney went to show that after parting with the deceased at 10 o'clock on the night of the fatality they heard a fall, and on going to the place from whence the noise came, observed Mrs Vaughan on the ground at the foot of the stairs. Mrs. Mahony raised her up but she did not speak.

The evidence of Dr. Shanahan showed that when he arrived life was extinct. Death, he said, must have been due to fracture of the base of the skull.

A verdict was returned accordingly.

FIRE AT DOONAGORE QUARRIES.

Considerable Damage.

A fire which caused considerable damage broke out at the Messrs Watson's quarries, Doonagore, on Saturday. While the men were at dinner smoke was noticed issuing in thick volumes from the building in which the plant and fittings for the electric lighting of the quarries and houses were worked. The interior was a mass of flames, and, despite the efforts of willing workers, was practically gutted. All the electric plant was destroyed, and a fine motor car, which had been built in the works, was also consumed. Some of the local workmen under Mr. Watson and Mr. Vaughan did gallant work in endeavouring to save the valuable property, and happily succeeded in confining the flames. The quarry work will not be interfered with by the fire.
