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LIMERICK FARMER'S SUICIDE.

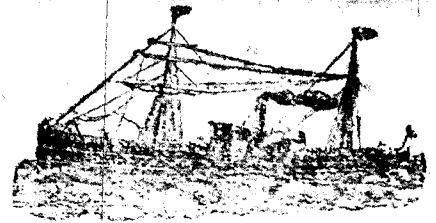
A verdict of suicide while temporarily insane

 cut his throat. Assistance arrived, and the poor
 man was medically treated, but the wound proved
 fatal.
