We record with very sincere regret, which is shared in by the citizens at large, the death of an old and highly esteemed Limerickman, Mr. John Guinane, J.P., which took place at his residence, Queen street, last night. I hough Mr. Guinane had been in ill health for some time past, and confined to his house for less than a fortnight, his demise was unexpected. It occurred about ten clock, and the sad tidings soon spread through the city. Mr. Guinane was a gentleman of a most kindly, affable, and genial manner, an excellent "raconteur," and one of the best authorities on lead official to the content of local affairs. Family history, or local doings in the dim and distant past, he had at his fingers' ends, and was always accessible to those who sought information at his hands. He was a liberal in politics, and figured in some noted city elections, amongst them the contest of the late Mr. D. F. Gabbett and Mr. Richard U'Shaughnessy against the late Sir James Spaight. Mr. Guinane was agent for the Gabbett system. agent for the Gabbett estate and various other properties, and was ever on the most friendly terms with the tenantry. He was a magistrate for the city for more than twenty years, and was a constant attendant on the bench. In public life he filled a considerable part. He frequently served as a Grand Juror for the city; was a member of the Board of Guardians for many years, where he evinced a deep interest in the sick and the poor; he was elected one of the representatives of the Glentworth Ward in the Corporation on the passing of the Local Government Act, and was again returned at the triennial elections in January last. Everything tending to the welfare of his native city, had his heartiest sympathy, and by all classes and creeds in Limerick—by the poor, to whom he was a tried and staunch friend—his demise is deeply regretted. We tender our sincere sympathy to his widow, and relatives in their bereavement.
